THE ROBERT EVANS STORY



I was born in January 1939, 6 days after black Friday, the hottest day ever recorded in NSW, and now 80 years later, in similar weather, I recall my past life.

My primary schooling was in Forbes and Dubbo in the central west of NSW and High school at Wollongong High, a selective high. What a shock after one term at Dubbo High!!

Because I had lost the sight one eye 6 months prior to sitting my LC, I failed and continued my

studies at evening college whilst working in the family furniture business,

At twenty, it was time to move to Sydney, after obtaining a cadetship with Fibre Containers, a manufacturer of corrugated boxes, and at the same time I enrolled at UNSW in the Commerce faculty. Perhaps not a great idea, for soon I was working past the normal 5 pm and lectures commenced at 6pm and ran till 9. 5 days per week.

Later, I became a member the Commerce Society, serving 2 years as President, and then the Rugby Club, so time for lectures became less and less, so after 3 years I finally dropped my chance of a degree.

My roles at Fibre Containers included Customer Service Manager, Product Development, and then Methods Engineer.

My claim to fame was the development of the "bag in box" concept for the transport and marketing of wine. This has now become a worldwide phenomenon.

Impatient for further promotion, I joined Corinthian Industries as Production Manager of the Corinite Division, laminating melamine products to particle board, plywood and Masonite for the caravan industry. As this was a 12 hour's shift operation, I was expected to see both shifts on and off, which meant 13 hour days at the factory, plus 3 hours on Saturday for cleaning.

After 8 months of this, hardly seeing my wife and 3 young daughters, I pulled the plug and was head hunted to work as a contractor for APD, the food division of British Tobacco, where I worked with Greg Croker!!, and later rejoined the corrugated box industry, charged with the job of changing growers concepts of packaging from wooden boxes to corrugated boxes.

Then, after an 18 months stint as Production Manager of a fruit and vegetable prepacking operation, I rejoined the Fibre packaging industry in a company which was to become Amcor Fibre Packaging.

My life changed at this point of time, as after my marriage breakdown, I remarried, to my wife Helen, inheriting a son and another daughter. After 25 years, in various roles, I was made redundant, only to be offered a position with Visy Board, the following day, as a contract salesman.

What a change to my life this made, as I managed to only work 1 day per week, though each morning I spent some time on my computer and had plenty of spare time.

Prior to being made redundant, I had purchased a Triton 2000 Work Centre, and attended a meeting organised by Philip Hirshbein via the Triton Company, with a view to starting a Triton User Group in the Hills Shire. At this meeting Philip was elected President, and I, the foundation Secretary, a position I held for 5 years.

Prior to moving to our apartment in September 2016 we had lived in our home in Castle Hill for 28 years, there I undertook many woodworking and building projects, in addition to making, over the years, hundreds of ducks, toy cars and sundry other toys for Westmead Children's Hospital and our usual Christmas appeal. Fortunately, I had been able to duplicate, on a minor scale, similar equipment to what we have in our shed, which simplified my task.

Hopefully I'll be able to continue working at the club for many years to come.
